**NO MOW MAY 2.0** BHV encourages residents to let lawns grow up to a foot tall! In support of protecting pollinator habitat, we encourage property owners to reduce mowing and maintain lawn heights between 6 and 12 inches during the month of May.

No Mow May is a national conservation campaign to support the survival of pollinators by encouraging people not to start mowing their lawns until the end of May. This creates a boost in the number of flowers, and nectar, available to pollinating insects such as bees, butterflies and moths. By participating in No Mow May, you'll spend less time, money, and energy on your lawn while helping to improve the planet.

Reduced frequency of mowing has been shown to have direct and indirect benefits to pollinator species, including: availability of more floral resources, less production of emissions from fossil fuel powered equipment, reduced noise from powered equipment, reduced compaction of soil, and associated improved stormwater infiltration.

## **CLIMATE CORNER**

We Have Many Opportunities to Recycle – Take Advantage!

In the Village, we have two bins available to recycle common items such as glass, metal, paper, cardboard, and some plastics. The great news is that we also have the opportunity to recycle much more by dropping off additional items at various sites around Ann Arbor. Click on any of the links below to get specific information about times and requirements.

- On June 24<sup>th</sup>, Washtenaw County is hosting a "<u>county clean-up day</u>" in Northfield Township just north of Barton Hills where they'll accept appliances, bulk and hazardous waste, scrap metal, tires, and electronics. Registration opens May 12<sup>th</sup>.
- The <u>Subaru dealership</u> at 3771 Jackson Road has bins set up inside the showroom allowing visitors to recycle coffee & creamer capsules; snack, candy, and chip wrappers; and plastic straws, cups, and lids.
- At the <u>BYOC store</u> downtown at 255 E Liberty, you can recycle your razors and blades; food storage containers; crayons and pens; solo cups; oral care waste; beauty product packaging; snack and candy wrappers; and, bread bags.
- For a \$3 fee, the Ann Arbor Recycling drop-off station at 2950 Ellsworth takes many items including clothing, fabric and textiles; car and rechargeable batteries; motor oil and filters; Styrofoam; plastic bags (dry cleaning, shopping, bread, vegetable, etc.) Plus, they have individual charges for recycling additional items such as tires, electronics, lightbulbs, and appliances.
- The <u>Best Buy</u> at 3100 Lohr Road accepts up to three items per household per day including: TVs, monitors, computers, radios, appliances, VCRs, printers, video games and gadgets, toner cartridges, shredders, hair dryers and curling irons, vacuums, cables, and connectors.
- In addition to the items listed above under Best Buy, <u>Staples</u> in the Westgate shopping center also accepts calculators, printers, camcorders, fax machines, modems, routers, scanners, iPod/MP3 players, keyboards and mice, video streaming devices, and battery backup devices.
- The <u>Scrap Box</u> at 4567 Washtenaw accepts many types of donations for reuse including leftover wrapping paper and bows, greeting cards and envelopes, cookie and Altoids tins, prescription bottles with lids (clean, transparent with no labels), paint chip samples, upholstery books, carpet samples, colorful house paint, clothespins, clean plastic bottle caps, and so much more.
